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Message from the Mayor

It's been an exciting and busy year in Parkville. Many community events were held this summer in downtown Parkville including the July 4th festivities, Parkville Days and the return of Final Fridays. In 2016, the City received a Government Finance Officers' Association (GFOA) award for the 2016 annual budget, submitted grant applications for improvements to Route 9 from Route 45 to Clark Avenue, held a strategic planning workshop to set priorities for 2017, released a request for proposals for development near the intersection of I-435 and Route 45 and improved English Landing and Platte Landing parks by carving a dead cottonwood tree into an eagle and adding dog park amenities that were donated by Girl Scout Troop 591, and trail enhancements.

The activity won't slow down this fall and winter. The City plans to sweep the streets, adopt updates to the zoning and subdivision regulations and Parks Master Plan, complete the first phase of renovations of the restroom in English Landing Park and add the finishing touches on the stone pillars at the White Aloe Bridge at the entrance to downtown. Work will begin by MoDOT on the Route 45 widening project from Route K to I-435 this fall that will continue through 2017. A

groundbreaking ceremony was held on October 24 at the intersection of Route 45 and Brink Myers Road where the work will begin. The City is currently working on the 2017 budget for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2017.

2016 Budget Award and 2017 Budget Process

The City of Parkville received the Governmental Finance Officers' Association (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the city's 2016 annual budget. The award is the highest form of recognition in governmental budgeting. Only 29 municipalities statewide received the award in 2015, putting Parkville among the top three percent of its peers for excellence in municipal budgeting.

The City of Parkville is currently working on the 2017 Budget for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2017. The process involves four work sessions with the Board of Aldermen to discuss priorities for the upcoming year. The City has an annual operating budget of approximately \$13 million across 15 governmental funds that represent municipal services including police, sanitary sewers, streets, parks, economic development, and much more. Adoption is scheduled for the regular meeting on December 20 at 7:00 p.m. A link to the 2016 budget can be found on the City's website.

Update on development near the Intersection of I-435 and Route 45

In 2006, the City of Parkville responded to petitions from property owners and created two Neighborhood Improvement Districts (NIDs) near the western boundary of Parkville at the intersection of Interstate 435 and Missouri Route 45. The NIDs were undertaken for a public sewer and a road project. The City issued 20-year limited general obligation bonds for both NIDs in 2014 in a total principal amount of \$9 million.

The debt is backed by special assessments collected on properties within the NIDs. Due to a variety of factors, including the recent economic recession, private development did not occur according to the original schedule and vision. In 2015, the City filed judicial foreclosure petitions against two properties within the NIDs that were delinquent on payment of special assessments. Through court action and settlements, the City now owns approximately 50 acres on the southwest corner of the intersection and 73 acres on the southeast corner. The City released two development Requests for Proposals (RFPs) – one for each site – in June 2016 and one proposal was received for the southeast corner. A selection committee of city officials and community partners will evaluate the proposal and make a recommendation to the Board of Aldermen later this year. The city, in partnership with the Parkville Economic Development Council, continues to actively seek development partnerships for these properties, with an emphasis on neighborhood commercial, light industrial and mixed residential. 2016 Strategic Planning Workshop

In July 2016, the City of Parkville held its annual strategic planning workshop. The purpose of the day-long session was to refine Parkville's strategic priorities, identify specific initiatives to advance for the 2017 budget year and beyond and strengthen the working relationships of the members of the governing body. The mayor and all members of the Board of Aldermen participated, and department heads and other senior staff attended to help answer questions and provide context for discussions.

The governing body affirmed the City's vision statement and five critical success factors – those things that must go well in order to achieve the vision. In addition, immediate priorities were set for the 2017 budget year. Additional information is available in the summary report from the workshop on the City's website.



Zoning & Subdivision Regulations Update

The City's zoning codes and subdivision regulations promote the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Parkville by encouraging the most appropriate and best use of land throughout the city. Many of these codes and regulations were adopted over 40 years ago, and most have not been comprehensively updated. The Zoning & Subdivision Regulations' Update will develop clear, understandable and user-friendly zoning and subdivision regulation documents that are consistent with existing City plans and policies.

The first public open house was held on May 23, 2016. The consultant team finished conducting its section-by-section review of the City's codes and regulations, identifying issues or concerns, conflicts with state statutes, significant deviations from best-practices and how the regulations either align or conflict with significant planning policies of the City. A second open house is scheduled for Wednesday, November 16, 2016 (5:30-7:30 p.m.), at the Mosaic Life Center at 6185 Jefferson Avenue to present the substantial improvements and modifications to the Code. The goal is to have a final draft adopted by the Board of Aldermen in December 2016.

Route 9 Corridor Update

On January 5, 2016, the Board of Aldermen adopted the Route 9 Corridor Study, which builds upon prior planning efforts that were aimed at preserving the character of downtown Parkville while capitalizing on opportunities to enhance economic activity. The study contains preliminary design plans for safety and multi-modal improvements for twelve project segments along Route 9 from Route 45 in Parkville to Mattox Road in Riverside. This includes additional turning lanes, curb and gutter stormwater improvements, a 10 foot shared-use path for non-motorized users, sidewalks, signals, marked crosswalks and pedestrian lighting improvements.

On March 15, 2016, the Board of Aldermen approved a resolution

of support for improvements for the first two segments of Route 9, from Route 45 to Clark Avenue. Based on this recommendation, staff submitted an application to the Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) for federal-aid transportation funding and participated in a three-month programming and selection process through MARC's committees. The programming committees recommended \$965,800 in federal funding for Route 9 improvements. An additional \$241,450 is anticipated from future revenues from the 9 Highway Community Improvement District as part of the community's required local match, accounting for a total project of \$1,207,250. The City is currently evaluating implementation options.



English Landing Park Restroom

The English Landing Park Restroom is currently closed for renovations. The City is working with several contractors to rehabilitate the existing restroom, including accessibility improvements, new flooring, new wall coverings, new plumbing fixtures and new mirrors. Exterior improvements include construction of an accessible sidewalk path and the installation of a water fountain. The project is partially funded through parks' donations and a Platte County Outreach Grant. The renovation is planned for completion in mid-November, but the restrooms will be winterized and closed for the season until spring, 2017.



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Eagle Naming

On October 12 the name was unveiled for the eagle carving in English Landing Park. "Raji Ke. Pi Ke!" comes from the Otoe-Missouria language meaning "You arrived here. It is good." The name is posted on the plaque next to a history of the tribe.

The state of Missouri and the Missouri River are both named after the Missouria Tribe, which once lived in the region and controlled traffic and trade along the Missouri River and its tributaries. In the late 1700s, the Missourias went to live with their relatives, the Otoes. As was their tradition, the tribes would migrate to follow the buffalo, but they stayed in a general area of Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas. In 1881, they were moved to Red Rock, Oklahoma, where the tribe is currently located.

Parks Master Plan

Parkville has long been a destination for regional visitors in addition to serving community residents. This is due, in no small part, to the excellent park facilities. In surveys, residents credit parks, open space and recreational opportunities for their high quality of life in addition to small town atmosphere and proximity to all the amenities the metro area has to offer.

At the beginning of the year, the City kicked off a process to update the 2008 Parkville Parks Plan. The Plan was created to provide a road map for the utilization, development and expansion of Parkville's current and future park system. The primary goal is to re-examine community priorities for the riverfront parks and document a long-term strategy for park development that has mutual support from the City and County. The City conducted targeted focus group discussions, key leader interviews, and employee interviews in mid-March to gain perspective of different visions and ideas about the future direction of the parks in an intimate setting. The public was invited to provide input on the plan at two Community Open House events held in the spring and summer. Online surveys were available for those who were unable to attend the meeting.

After community input was consolidated, a revised riverfront park concept and the full master plan were approved by the steering committee in mid-October. The plan sets a long-term vision and action plan for the park system, providing the City of Parkville a road map for facilities and maintaining and improving the system and operations. It is anticipated that the new parks master plan will be reviewed by the Parkville Board of Aldermen in early November. Street Sweeping

In February, the City collected bids from street sweeping contractors to sweep all of the city's streets and public parking areas. Fall street sweeping work is anticipated to be completed in mid-November. The City requests that residents refrain from parking cars on public streets and parking areas so the streets can be thoroughly cleaned. 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Friends of Parkville Parks

Friends of Parkville Parks (FOPP) is pleased to announce their partnership with the City of Parkville on two upcoming projects. Pending formal acceptance by the Parkville Board of



Aldermen, FOPP has supplied the City a combined gift of \$25,000 to help support upcoming projects in the Park including an additional shelter house close to the river near Grigsby Field.

FOPP was founded in 2009 to help fund capital improvements in the City's parks and encourage citizen involvement. Over the years FOPP has been blessed with the gifts of time and talent as well as monetary help from the community.

In the last few years, the City of Parkville has initiated a Parks' Donation Program that has created multiple avenues for citizens to give back to the parks they value. FOPP is grateful to the City for taking up this cause, filling the void noticed in 2009. This has allowed FOPP to donate a portion of its remaining resources to Parkville as it closes the organization.

The Board of Directors of FOPP extends appreciation to everyone that made this dream a reality.

Missouri American Water Plant Relocation

The Parkville Planning and Zoning Commission and Board of Aldermen recently approved plans for Missouri American Water to relocate its current drinking water treatment facility at 101 E. 1st Street to an eleven acre property approximately one mile west of Main Street on Highway FF. This location was selected due to its close proximity to Missouri American Water's existing underground wells along the Missouri River in Platte Landing Park. The existing facility in downtown Parkville was in need of renovation and upgrades and the new modernized plant will double the existing capacity to help meet increased usage from area customers during peak hour demand. The Board of Aldermen approved the final site plan on September 20, 2016. Construction is underway and the new water plant is expected to open by the end of 2017. The City of Parkville is working with Missouri American Water and the Parkville Economic Development Council to explore redevelopment opportunities for the existing site in downtown Parkville.

New Trail and Signage Improvements

In 2009, the voters of Platte County approved a 10-year half-cent sales tax for parks, recreation and stormwater control. A portion of the sales tax proceeds is allocated for the Outreach Grant Program, which the Platte County Commission developed to promote the development of local parks, recreation facilities and programs to enhance the quality of life for all residents. It strengthens partnerships between the county, local governments and non-profit organizations to strategically meet common goals. Applicants must be a local government, school district, or other public subdivision of the state of Missouri. Approximately \$250,000 is available each year through this program.

In 2016, the City received an outreach grant of \$7,749 for trail improvements in English Landing Park and Platte Landing Park. Improvements included:

- Removing the existing five-foot asphalt trail around Grigsby Field and replacing the Grigsby trail with a new 8- to 10-foot gravel trail
- Adding new directional signs and mile markers to the Parkville 5K and 10K race route through English Landing Park and Platte Landing Park; the route was officially certified by USA Track and Field. The markers were installed in October.
- Installing three display boards around the park showing the 5K and 10K courses, along with park amenities. The new display boards will be installed in November.

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STORMWATER QUALITY

You can help keep Parkville’s water bodies clean and healthy. By keeping waste and hazardous materials out of the storm drains, you are doing your part to reduce flooding and pollution in our local waterways. During a rainfall, water runs across rooftops, down streets and across parking lots and yards, and then washes down City storm drains, eventually reaching our local lakes, creeks and

the Missouri River. Along the way, this stormwater “runoff” picks up materials like fertilizer, pet waste, litter, automotive fluids and yard waste. Runoff enters our water bodies untreated. Water that goes down the sink or toilet and flows through a sewer system to a wastewater treatment plant, unlike runoff, is treated and cleaned before being released.

What can you do?

Here are 7 simple actions you can take to help reduce stormwater pollution:

1. Never dump anything down a storm drain or drainage ditch.
2. Properly dispose of trash. Trash left in a yard or on the street will eventually end up in the closest creek or stream.
3. Place your cigarette butts in the proper receptacle.
4. Recycle used motor oil and never dump oil, gasoline or solvents down a storm drain.
5. Wash your car at a commercial car wash because they have procedures for treating the used water, oil and chemicals.
6. Clean up after your pet; pet waste contains harmful bacteria.
7. Do not put leaves in the street or in storm drains.

Payment Drop Box

Parkville residents can drop off utility (Parkville sewer and Missouri American Water) payments (no cash) at City Hall 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. A drop box was installed on the west side of the sidewalk on the north side of City Hall; a map of the location is posted on the City’s website. A sign has been posted in front of the parking space to designate the utility drop-off parking.





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PUBLIC WORKS

Summer in Review

The Public Works staff has been busy overseeing and implementing several projects throughout the City.

- Installation of a new roof on the historic train depot, including replacement of 100% of the decking.
- Replacement of the roof on the first-come shelter in English Landing Park next to the restroom.
- Commissioning of a sculpture of the eagle in English Landing Park from artist, TJ Jenkins; the carving is located behind McKeon Stage.
- Completion of the Route 9 Downtown Entryway Beautification Project; it included the installation of the main entryway sign and landscaping (near Coffey Road), the downtown markers at the White Aloe Bridge and 22 decorative streetlights and banners along Route 9.
- Demolition of the abandoned house along Hwy. 9, south of the Pinecrest subdivision entrance.
- Installation of a new pump and new paint for the Spirit Fountain near the historic train depot.
- Street improvements on N. Crooked Road, Brink Myers Road, Main Street, Mill Street and in the Bell Industrial Park, the National and in Riss Lake. The program included asphalt mill and overlay, microsurfacing, curb and sidewalk repairs, pavement markings and crack sealing.
- Improvements to the Parks Headquarters Building in English Landing Park that included structural improvements and electrical upgrades.
- Maintenance of the pond behind the Parkville Athletic Complex (PAC), including dredging, conversion from a dry detention pond to a wet retention pond, and installation of an aerator fountain to circulate the water. The work was completed through a partnership with Quik-Trip and Platte County.
- Continued sewer cleaning and televising of the sanitary sewer pipes through the annual closed-circuit television (CCTV) program. Several pipes were identified and repaired through the annual Sanitary Sewer Repairs' program.

What's a Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO)?

SSOs can be caused by anything capable of obstructing the flow of wastewater in a sewer. The buildup of solids and fats, oils and greases (FOG) in the wastewater collection system is a major concern. When an obstruction blocks the flow of wastewater within a pipe, the wastewater may backup and overflow through a manhole, cleanout, toilet, sink or drain. This overflowing wastewater may make its way into the environment, a house or a business.



- SSOs contain everything that goes down your drain – and we mean **EVERYTHING!**
 - Additionally, SSOs can carry bacteria, viruses, and various diseases.
 - Children, the elderly and people with compromised immune systems face added risk.
 - In water bodies the environmental impacts of sewage include: hypoxia, algal blooms, habitat degradation, floating debris, and aquatic species die-offs.
- Where does grease come from?** Traditionally, grease is thought of as oil used for frying and bacon grease but grease and oils can be found in other food stuff. Items commonly found to have greases and oils: milk, butter, ice cream, frosting, baked goods, chicken skins, creams and sauces and salad dressing

- Submit payment in person or over the phone – cash, check, money order or credit card accepted (convenience fee applies to credit card payment)
- Dog tag is good for one year from the date of purchase

Renewal notice reminders will be sent prior to the license's expiration.

If you have had a license in the past and your pet has passed away, please notify City Hall at (816) 741-7676.

NO VISIT LIST

Businesses and residents may request to be added to the No Visit List to restrict visits by peddlers, solicitors, and canvassers. All solicitors, peddlers and canvassers are required to adhere to the No Visit List which is provided to each permit holder and is available online. To add your residential or business address to the No Visit List, visit the City's website.

Register Golf Carts




City ordinances allow residents to operate golf carts or low-speed vehicles on public streets within the Parkville city limits, but each cart must be registered with the City.

To get registered:

- Complete the application (on the City's website or in person)
- Submit a satisfactory inspection for golf carts two years or older
- Submit the completed application, proof of insurance coverage and inspection in person at 8880 Clark Avenue or via e-mail to cityhall@parkvillemo.gov
- Submit payment in person or over the phone – cash, check, money order or credit card accepted (convenience fee applies to credit card payment)

The decal received at City Hall must be clearly displayed on the back of your golf cart. Registration is good for 2 years from the time of submission; and renewal notices will be sent prior to the registration's expiration.

PARKVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE FUND
