

Level of Service


An inventory was taken of all Parkville parks including the amenities found in each. Parks were evaluated on a number of criteria (separate from their amenities) in categories including Access, Safety, and Comfort. Amenities were evaluated on their Condition and Accessibility. A Level of service is the product of park performance and amenity condition. The dashed line represents a minimum performance goal which all parks in Parkville should achieve.














How Parks Are Funded




What Is a Floodway?


A “Regulatory Floodway” means the channel of a river or other watercourse and the adjacent land areas that must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the water surface elevation more than a designated height. Communities must regulate development in these floodways to ensure that there are no increases in upstream flood elevations.

What Is a Floodplain?


The Floodplain is considered to be the land adjoining lakes and rivers that is covered by the “100-year” or “regional” flood. This flood is considered to be a flood that has a 1 percent chance of occurring in any given year. The flood fringe is the remainder of the floodplain lying outside of the floodway.




